## THE VOICE

"Therefore encourage one another and build each other up, just as in fact you are doing." -1 Thessalonians 5:11

Once a month, I gather via Zoom with a group of ten pastors from around the synod. We started as participants in a Lilly Foundation grant focused on learning a variety of spiritual practices (not an easy thing to do via Zoom!). After we'd gone through the twelve lessons together, we decided we'd so enjoyed gathering, particularly as a support system during Covid, that we'd continue meeting and center our time on reading books together. Right now we are making our way through Dietrich Bonhoeffer's classic, *Life Together*.

This month, after doing a quick catch-up on health and kids and parents, one in the group asked if we could all share where our congregation is on dealing with current Covid levels. The responses ranged from not meeting in person, to everything being back to "normal". One has only 20 in worship but 100 online. One has stopped offering online worship because there's no one to help with the technology. Some are masked. Some are fighting about masks. (Thank you, for not being *that* congregation, by the way.) For most, there is still a lot of disruption.

We turned to Bonhoeffer then, and to a person, we'd all marked this passage:

"It is by God's grace that a congregation is permitted to gather visibly around God's word and sacrament in this world. Not all Christians partake of this grace. The imprisoned, the sick, the lonely who live in the diaspora, the proclaimers of the gospel in [distant] lands stand alone. They know that visible community is grace." Dietrich Bonhoeffer, *Life Together*, page 2)

We do kind of take it for granted, don't we?

The ability to gather for worship, to hear prayers intoned, to ponder what God's word is saying to us today, to sing the great hymns of the church and praise songs from more recent composers.

To see chubby, beautiful babies baptized.
To hear bells rung and drums beat
and keyboards played and strings stummed.

To hear the words

Your sins are forgiven...Peace be with you....Christ's body and blood given for you.

We take that all for granted.

Or we did until March of 2020,

when suddenly we couldn't gather, or sing, or hear those words of comfort.

Like those on the list Bonhoeffer made ...

the imprisoned and sick

and those who live where Christians are few and far between ...

suddenly we became part of that list.

Add to it those living in the midst of pandemic.

We learned the hard way that "visible community is grace," and if nothing else positive comes from months and months of living under the dark cloud that is Covid, I give thanks for the way it has reminded me of what a blessing and privilege it is to be able to gather with God's beloved people.

One of the statements that often gets thrown around during an interim time is that "it's just natural for attendance to drop." You may have noticed by now that I'm a glass *half full* kind of person, so I reject that kind of thinking. In fact, I believe that attendance should at least be the same, but because we're at the beginning of an exciting journey toward a new pastor and a new time in the life of the congregation, I think our energy and enthusiasm should be drawing people to us.

So one of the disciplines I hope you will have during this interim time is regular worship attendance. Frankly, there's too much going on around Our Redeemer's to not be present. You don't want to miss out!

And it's a sign of God's grace to us that we are permitted to gather.

See you on Sunday. Or Wednesday. Pastor Trina

#### **Development Planning Update from the design team.**

Our Redeemer's Lutheran Church, along with our partners; The City of Helena, Helena Area Habitat for Humanity, YWCA, Rocky Mountain Development Council, and Trust Montana were granted \$40,000 of planning money through the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program. This, along with partner matching funds and City funds of \$28,000, are funding a development planning process for our land. This process will help determine partner and congregational goals, community and development goals, and the general feasibility of developing the property around the church. To lead ORLC and our partners through this process, the consultant team of Mosaic Architecture and SMA Architects, along with consultants Stahly Engineering and GL Development have been hired.

During September and October, the congregation has been involved in the first phase of this planning effort – to discuss and assess future church mission goals. The goal of these discussions has been to establish a church campus boundary beyond which the congregation is comfortable allowing our housing partners to begin planning housing.

We kicked off this mission planning effort with a Listening Session with our neighbors. We sought neighborhood feedback on future church missions as well as site amenities the neighborhood would be interested in seeing as a part of the development. Feedback was gathered using an online survey tool. Of the possible future church mission developments presented, the neighbors reacted most positively to Preschool Expansion, Community Multipurpose Building, and Daycare. Site amenities of most interest to the neighborhood were creek access, playground, and trails.

Following the Listening Session, congregational members have engaged in a series of three progressive meetings (each meeting offered at two different times) focused on evaluating future church missions that impact site utilization.

The first of these meetings was focused on assessing and discussing a list of future missions developed by the Property Development Committee. Again, an online survey tool was used to assess priorities of future missions and development principles. We learned that maintaining a land development ethic informed by sustainable principles is a high priority for church members. These principles would include minimizing the impacts of development on existing soils, water sources. vegetation, and animals; optimizing the proportion of open space to built space suitable for the well-being of residents and rainwater runoff management; and promoting energy efficient construction, on-site renewable production, and on-site recycling collection and composting. The other foundational

principle for planning affirmed was the idea of



"faith mission" – the understanding that we cannot fully know the future needs of this congregation and thus need to provide opportunity for these unknown future missions. Mission development opportunities that ranked highest were preschool, daycare, columbarium/memorial garden, outdoor worship space and community garden.

The second of these meetings was a site planning exercise at which participants in small groups had the opportunity to look at a site plan with scaled future missions located on the "church campus". Pre-cut scaled development blocks could also be used to test alternative placements and arrangements of these, and small groups were encouraged to generate discussion around these design alternatives and share them with the larger group.

The final meetings of this phase were held on Sunday, October 10<sup>th</sup> and Wednesday, October 13<sup>th</sup>. At these meetings the design team presented a site plan for the church campus including high priority future mission development. Additionally, general givens and preliminary road layouts for the remainder of the site were presented for context. **The church campus boundary proposed for planning purposes received full support from meeting participants.** 

On **Sunday, November 14**<sup>th</sup>, **between services**, the congregation will hold a **congregational meeting** at which the proposed boundary will be presented, and a vote of the congregation will be requested to affirm the boundary for the purposes of allowing our planning partners to begin planning housing for the remainder of the property. Look for future announcements of this important vote.







But wait! Adults, do you love hanging out with our youth and have a couple of hours to spare? We would love to have some adults hands helping with this endeavor too!



Each month, the ORLC Development Planning Team will be offering an article from one of our development partners. It is our hope, that through this effort, we might come to better understand each of the non-profit partners who have joined us in this development planning process. This month's article is from Rocky Mountain Development Council.

Rocky Mountain Development Council, Inc. strives to improve quality of life and promote self-sufficiency for individuals and families.

Rocky is a Community Action Agency, formed in 1965 after President Lyndon Johnson declared a "war on poverty" in response to a national poverty rate of 19%. Several pieces of legislation were passed and this law is how Community Action Programs were born. As a community resource for individuals and families, Rocky is committed to improving quality of life, especially for low-income citizens, in Lewis & Clark, Broadwater, and Jefferson Counties. Currently, Rocky encompasses senior services, affordable housing, energy assistance, child care, Head Start and provides senior volunteer opportunities.

Over the past 20 years, Rocky has developed and managed almost 400 affordable apartments for seniors and families. Our vision with the ORLC project is to create affordable homes for low to moderate-income families in the Helena area. Our community is in the midst of a housing crisis and finding a safe home is more difficult than ever. Currently Rocky has 469 families on the waiting list for our newly constructed Red Alder Residences. Generally, we build side-by-side duplex, triplex, or 4-plex buildings with individual entrances and work hard to create a community feel. These projects come with a 46-year commitment to affordability. Rocky's mission is to keep our homes affordable for families perpetually.

- Pastor Trina opened the meeting with a devotion.
- The September Church Council meeting minutes were approved as distributed.
- Jason presented two proposals for additions to the budget: 1) \$1300 for an A/V technical assistant during the live stream service. This will allow those watching the 8:30 service remotely to hear and feel more engaged in the service. 2) \$2475 to pay a pianist to help lead Wednesday Spark services. Feedback from the HolyCow survey and small group discussion show having a high-quality music component to worship is important to the congregation. Discussion among the council showed support for investing in our worship experience.
- Sarah Magee, Financial Director, gave the September financial report. The council moved to create a payable for council funds and building funds and not make the benevolence payments for September.
- Pastor Trina reported we average 37 online views of the 8:30 service, which translates into 55-75 individuals accessing worship this way. Experts say that each view should be considered 1.5 2 people viewing.
- The Property Development Team held mission planning sessions with the congregation and has a tentative footprint of about 7.75 acres for church use. There will be a congregational meeting in November concerning the grounds.
- The Generosity Committee is studying a Montana Sydnodical Stewardship Pilot project called <u>Fed by Ravens</u>, based on I Kings 17. Dennis Trotter is leading the project.
- There will be a congregational meeting on Sunday, October 31, to review the findings from the HolyCow congregational survey.
- The Call Committee has been installed and will continue the work begun by the Transition Team. The first meeting of the Call Committee will be with Pastor Jason, Associate to the Bishop. He will provide guidance and direction to the committee and assist with the process once the Ministry Site Profile is complete.
- The budget for 2022 is being built and will be presented to the Council in November. The congregation will vote on it at the December Annual Meeting.

#### The value of God's Peace

In the Spring of this year, I was diagnosed with breast cancer. The diagnosis shocked me to my core, and I was overwhelmed with fear. I feared both the disease and the treatments. I struggled to cope. Food turned to ash in my mouth, and I lost nearly 20 pounds within a few short weeks. One day, I sat at my desk sobbing while my family was away from the house, and I prayed for God's peace. Later that day, it settled on me, and I felt a great sense of relief. I began to pray for God's peace regularly, and I received it over and over again. Thanks be to God!

As I went through the treatments for what turned out to be non-aggressive cancer, I began to reflect on the nature of God's peace, which was clear to me from the beginning as a lived experience. I realized that I'd never really considered it before. I passed the peace in worship, and I prayed for God's peace for others. It wasn't until this experience that I began to realize that God's peace is more than a nicety. It is a thing of real value.

So what is God's peace? It is a sense of calm when being calm makes little sense. It creates the quiet space needed for rational thinking and hopes to blossom. It allows acceptance to occur, and it builds strength. It pushes aside the chaos of mind and body and allows the soul to take center stage. It is a divine gift, and I recognize it as such. When I pass the peace to you now in worship, gone are the days of feeling like I'm just saying hi. I genuinely wish God's peace upon you and the blessings it brings.
