Although we likely will have several cold weeks and nasty storms between now and then, the Lenten season begins early in 2024, with Ash Wednesday occurring on February 14, Valentine's Day.

The Hunger Team will be sponsoring a church-wide discussion of a Lenten devotional book entitled Meeting Jesus at the Table. The devotions center around eight New Testament episodes when Jesus breaks bread with others and, in doing so, teaches others about loving, serving, and welcoming. 

Did you know that Annette Wakefield has been a member of Our Redeemer's Lutheran for almost 50 years? And she attended several years before becoming a member!

She's the sort of person whose faith shines through even in her toughest days. She's had a difficult couple of years recently and says that her faith is what's carried her through all the trials and turmoil.

Annette was born in Miles City to the Custer County Sheriff and his wife. She was baptized as an infant in Miles City. The family later moved to Helena, and she attended schools here, then went to what is now the University of Montana but was Montana State University at that time (Bozeman was Montana State

College). She landed a job with the Social Security Administration in Helena and worked for the agency for 32 years, although not always in Montana, retiring in 1992. She completed specialized training in Kansas City, and in 1960 moved to Milwaukee WI. While living in Milwaukee she was confirmed. Also, that's where she met the love of her life, Lynn Wakefield, who lived in Michigan, on a blind date at a wedding! They were married in 1964 and lived in Michigan until 1966 when they moved to Helena, with their baby Tom, and she began her association with our congregation. She's been here ever since! And she has blessed us in so many ways!

She sat behind Pastor Lowell Anderson one Sunday at worship, and he heard her voice. That prompted him to suggest that she join the choir! She did and sang in our choir until just a few years ago, when she became less able to move around and negotiate the choir loft. She volunteered in the church office when it was on Stuart Street and has done so off and on and is presently doing it again. She also became an integral part of the crafting and sewing for WELCA's annual fundraiser bazaar and introduced many creative projects that sold well. She feels badly that she has only sewed one quilt top in the last couple of years but prior to that she sewed several quilt tops for WELCA for the drawings. This Sew in Love group produces quilts and so much more for the guests at the Friendship Center. Those ladies also sell things at the bazaar to raise funds to buy batting and other quilting supplies so that they can continue to bless others. In fact, this week, (12/14/2023), they filled 16 of their pillowcases with health and beauty products, towels, mugs filled with candy and beautiful Christmas décor that they made or purchased to be taken to the Friendship Center. She has cooked and baked for many years for the bazaar but now is unable to stand and work very long. She is still providing rides for others and helping wherever she can. She led a Bible study group for the Forty Days of Purpose congregation-wide study many years ago and has participated in studies through the intervening years since. Another study she thought was outstanding was The Divine Drama written by Harry Wendt and lead by Pastor Martin Russell. Those of us who spend time with her know she has helped many, and she has a big serving heart.

She considers herself blessed to have been able to "pound a few nails and help to feed the Mission Builders" during construction of our current facility in 2011-2012 and is still supporting it to this day. She says, "I love this church! I always feel so peaceful when I'm here and I love the community."

She lost her beloved husband last year, but has a son Tom and a daughter Lynnette here in town, and is adjusting to her new and different life..." with His help". We are SO privileged to have her shining example of faith and trust and service in our midst!



2023 National Youth Summit

Once a year, the ELCA holds a National Youth Summit. The purpose of this summit is to strengthen the leadership skills and abilities of youth who are leaders in their setting. Two youth and one adult from each synod were invited to attend. This year, the theme was "Called On the Way" and the focus was on Advocacy. This seemed like a surprising theme, and I wondered how this would apply to developing the leadership skills of those who attended.

The way in which the leaders of the summit talked of advocacy and dealt with the topics discussed helped the youth understand that advocacy has many options and sizes. They learned that any way they care for those who are in need or who are marginalized is advocacy. They came away with eyes better opened to see options around them and with language skills so that what might be controversial can be talked about in ways that allow themselves and others to live in a space of discomfort. They learned that it is OK to be uncomfortable while still loving those they are helping, knowing we are all children of God.

The youth from Montana that attended were Morgan May of Our Redeemer's Lutheran in Helena and Kian Rvan of Bethel Lutheran in Great Falls. Here is what they had to say afterward:

Morgan: This year's Youth Summit was a huge opportunity and experience I will never forget. The people I met and the new friends I made are people I will always remember-especially the other representative from the Montana Synod, Kian Ryan.

Kian: The experience was amazing, the games and singing well connected (me to) others. It was very welcoming and kind. I made friends in those three days, but it felt like I've known them forever. When we left for departure to home, it was a horrible dejection. I miss my new best friends like Morgan May, who is part of the Montana Synod and changed my life forever. I'm so glad we met. We continue to stay connected with other friends. We were "Called On the Way."

It was an honor to spend four days with these two youth and with youth from all over the US as we learned together what it means to care in big and small ways for the needs we see around us. We are Church, Better Together!

HUNGER TEAM NEWS

THANK YOU - 2023 The Hunger Team is an extension of you.

THANK YOU to everyone at Our Redeemer's. This community continues to shower its neighbors with blessings every single day. We give special thanks to the following:

- The Lutheran World Relief Quilters for their generous donations of awesome guilts for God's Love.
- The Sew in Love Crew for the numerous creative travel bags donated to God's Love and Family Promise, as well as the many quilts donated for Family Promise.
- Family Promise volunteers for the village of helpers who assist every guarter Our Redeemer's hosts Family Promise. These volunteers buy groceries for the Day Center for the week, purchase evening snacks and treats for the families at our church, and provide daily dinner meals from Sunday to Thursday of each week. Two additional volunteers also serve as overnight hosts each night. The quiet helpers set up and tear down the rooms for our guests and do mountains of laundry at the end of that week.
- Contributors to the Summer Milk Campaign who made it possible to reach our \$22,000 goal for purchasing milk for the Kid Packs for the entire school year. Special thanks to Town Pump and the Our Redeemer's Perpetual Fund. Without all of you, the goal would not have been met. We count this as a miracle.
- Kid Packs Volunteers who meet the first three Tuesdays of each month, October-April, to assemble Kid Packs. During the 2022-23 school year, they donated 510 hours of their time to assemble 25.592 bags, filling 3,199 crates! Approximately 44,000 Kid Packs were distributed for the entire school year.
- **Community Garden Volunteers** who show up to plant, weed, harvest, water, and keep our garden producing. We are also grateful to the Carroll College students for planting in the spring, our Vacation Bible School kids for planting in June, the Boy Scouts for their service and choosing our garden as a way to earn badges, and the Master Gardeners earning credit. All of you helped to donate over 2000 lbs. of fresh vegetables to Helena Food Share this summer/fall. And thanks to all who donate grass and leaves each year to put the garden to rest. It was a bountiful, grateful harvest!
- Kendra Wilde Hunger Endowment Fund Donations-The funds this year were given to Helena Area Community Foundation (\$589.60 to assist displaced Iron Front renters) and to God's Love (\$294.80).
- Thrivent Grant Writers. The grants written by various Hunger Team members helped us achieve our goals.

In addition to all this, you kindly donate monthly for Helena Food Share, God's Love, and anything else that pops up. You keep on giving and giving and giving.

The Stewardship Committee is excited to sponsor a Charitable Estate Planning Seminar and discussion in the Community Room on January 14, 2024, at 9:45am and 12:15pm. Grace Schroeder Scott, a Senior Development Consultant serving Flathead Lutheran Bible Camp, and Doug Scott, an experienced Development and Planned Giving Officer assisting FLBC as a volunteer, will lead the seminar and provide helpful information and inspiration on charitable estate planning.

Our friends at New Life Lutheran and St. John's Lutheran have been invited to join us.

Required Minimum Distributions (RMD)

Individuals aged 73 or greater who have a traditional IRA, SIMPLE IRA, SEP IRA, 401(k), 403(b), or 457 (b) may be required to take Required Minimum Distributions (RMD) from these assets annually. Owners may make a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) to transfer up to \$100.000 to a non-profit organization (ORLC) I annually counting as some or all the owner's RMD and the amount will be excluded from the owner's adjusted gross income. Contact your investment account provider to request a QCD transfer and consult your tax adviser for any questions.

Appreciated Stock Donation

Individuals holding common stock, mutual funds, or exchange traded funds that have appreciated in value may gift these securities to a non-profit organization (ORLC) and receive an itemized deduction for the full amount of the securities value on the day of transfer avoiding paying capital gain taxes. This donation does not qualify as a tax deduction if the taxpayer takes the standard deduction but it does avoid potential capital gains taxes.

Consult your tax advisor for any questions.

GIVING WITH TAX BENEFITS

December Council Summary

Summary of December 17 proposed Ministry Plan Meeting

A special Congregational Meeting was held on Sunday, December 17, to consider the proposed Ministry Plan for 2024. A guorum was reached, with an attendance of 89 members.

Treasurer Tracey Tintinger outlined the Ministry Plan, explaining the need for the 5.2% increase over last year's budget. However, since the congregation is not on track to meet the entire amount budgeted for this year, meeting the 2024 budget will require a 25% increase in giving. The largest segment of the budget is for salaries and benefits in anticipation of hiring a full-time associate pastor, according to Synod salary guidelines. Tracey also reminded the congregation that the Building Fund is a separate account and was not part of the proposed budget. The mortgage balance presently sits at \$1,182,455.

Craig Erickson spoke on behalf of the Stewardship Committee, thanking the congregation for their incredible Benevolence Contributions to many community organizations and Lutheran World Relief. He also noted the need for technology upgrades and additional support for Flathead Lutheran Bible Camp. Craig reminded those present that Our Redeemer's is bucking the trend by increasing both membership and involvement. He also urged all members to increase their giving in 2024.

Numerous comments and questions were covered at the meeting. Others spoke words of encouragement for the budget, including reminders to everyone present to share the need for increased giving in the upcoming vear.

The budget was unanimously approved.

Merry Christmas! Let not your hearts be troubled. Believe in God; believe also in me. In my Father's house are many "Wait," you might say. "I seem to rooms. its publication, it's still "the season to be jolly!"

Well, then, how are you doing with that jolliness? Most of you have probably been fairly successful at being jolly leading up to, and following, Christmas. Our Redeemer's members are generally a pretty jolly lot. It's understandable, though, if you're struggling a bit more than usual given some massive storm clouds on the horizon and routine displays of humankind's seemingly unlimited capacity for inhumanity.

But this is a Christmas message. And Christmas means, above everything else HOPE. You know this, but it's always good to be reminded. Christmas is about God reconnecting with God's creatures by becoming one of them (us). It's a celebration of deliverance from ourselves. Each Sunday we confess that "we are in bondage to sin and cannot free ourselves." Christmas reminds us that, when God looked down at our extreme intransigence. God didn't threaten: "Don't make me come down there!" Instead, God came down here, in the most humble and loving of ways, to break loose the chains of fear that blind and bind us.

In the beginning was the Word [aka, Jesus], and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. ... All things were made through him... In him was life, and the life was the light of all. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it. ... For God so loved the world, that he gave the only Son [aka, Jesus], that whoever believes should not perish but have eternal life. For God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him. (See John, chapters 1 and 3.)

Christmas hope is supported by promise: God's promise of God's never-ending love for each of us, a promise wrapped in a body like ours, for eternity (including this moment, right now), fulfilled but not yet finally consummated.

The wolf shall dwell with the lamb, and the leopard shall lie down with the young goat, and the calf and the lion and the fattened calf together; and a little child shall lead them. They shall not hurt or destroy in all my holy mountain; for the earth shall be full of the knowledge of the LORD as the waters cover the sea. (God offering hope to the defeated and exiled people of Israel through the prophet Isaiah; see Isaiah, chapter 11.)

- people, and God himself will be with them as their God. God will wipe away every tear from their eyes, and death shall be no more, neither shall there be mourning, nor crying, nor pain anymore, for the former things have passed away. (God giving us all a glimpse of a promised eternity in God's presence; see Revelation, chapter 21.)
- That obviously doesn't mean we won't suffer in the meantime; we most certainly will. But there's a certain freedom in knowing that. There's freedom in knowing that deliverance will not come from the Democrats or the Republicans or the U.N. or even the Church. When people inevitably fail us, the disappointment is reduced by knowing people were never going to save us anyway. Knowing where to, and where not to, invest our hope allows us to engage more wisely and compassionately with others. It also frees us to work with God toward renewal and healing-aware that our best will never be enough but that God is ultimately capable and in charge. This understanding of our limits and God's limitlessness allows us to look for and receive God's peace and comfort in this life, in the midst of trial and hardship.

And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Helper to be with you forever, even the Spirit of truth...I will not leave you as orphans; I will come to you. Yet a little while and the world will see me no more, but you will see me. Because I live, you also will live. ... Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. Not as the world gives do I give to you. Let not your hearts be troubled, neither let them be afraid. (Jesus offering more hope to his closest disciples just before his execution; see John, chapter 14.)

So here's hoping that you and yours experienced hope anew this Christmas, and continue to experience God's loving, intimate presence. Here's hoping that encountering God's presence infuses you with a peace that transcends logic. May you carry that peace with you into the new year and share it with a world in dire need of a little peace. And as you journey, consider adding to your soundtrack that chart-topper from the first century band, Harold and the Angels: "Glory to the newborn King; Peace on earth, and mercy mild – God and sinners reconciled!"
