
Blessings and Godspeed, Baird!

around you. Your welcome to me grateful for you.

High schoolers, you blew me away with your leadership at the Confirmation Retreat in February and your kindness toward your younger peers throughout the year. You all give You have all been too good to me, but I can't say that me so much hope for the future of the church and the world simply by being the passionate, inclusive, kind, and fun people you are. God has incredible things in store for you each as you look ahead to young adulthood, and I hope you'll let Our Redeemer's celebrate you while you grow into your own people.



Council Meeting Summary April 19, 2022

Kevin Mathews opened the meeting with a devotion based on the Our Redeemer's mission statement, "Embraced by God's love we reach out to serve because our Redeemer lives!" He pointed out that this statement covers three main points, what we do, we reach out to serve, how we do it, we are embraced by God's love and the important why, because our Redeemer lives.

Beth Johnson reviewed the March financial report that Sarah Magee prepared. The general fund giving in March was more than had been given in 2021 and covered all the expenses for March and the carried over expenses from February with a small balance left over. The Council voted to maintain the cash balance to help cover the property assessment due in May of \$15,000. The benevolence was carried over to next month. Sarah talked about the phone system which was a used system when it was installed 10 years ago. Cody Salo will work with Sarah to review the bids which have been received and prepare a recommendation for the council to consider next month.

The ministry and committee reports were reviewed, Lynn Voss reported the preschool has a new director, and she will start on April 29 to work with Trudy. Also, the preschool is looking for teachers for the next school year.

The Covid protocol was reviewed and no change was recommended at this time. Lynn announced that the church has received the Certificate of Water Rights from DNRC. He thanked Ryan McLane and Bonner Armstrong for their work on this. The gift from the Mavis family has been received and per their request, split between the mortgage reserve and youth funds.

Lynn reminded the council members of the Ukraine Benefit Concert that Our Redeemer's is helping to sponsor on April 25 and 26, Baird Linke's last day is May 8 and Montana Synod Assembly is June 3-4 in Billings.





A Letter of Support for the Jewish Community in Montana

Dear Friends in Christ,

As we enter into these Holy Days of the Christian faith, we begin with Maundy Thursday, the day we remember Jesus' last meal with his disciples. During this meal, he again stated the command that God has given since the time of Moses: the command to love one another as God has love us. (Jn 13:34)

Jesus and his followers celebrated this meal as part of the Jewish Celebration of Passover when every year the Jewish people remember how God liberated them from slavery in ancient Egypt. (Ex 12) In this meal and in so many other ways, the Jewish and Christian faith traditions are intertwined. We share a common ancestor in Abraham and Sarah, share a common heritage in the Hebrew Scriptures. worship the one God who created heaven and earth, and recognize the humanity of all as created in the image of God. We are siblings, children of the same God, care-givers to the same world.

In honor of this abiding inter-relationship with our Jewish siblings, the Montana Synod Council and I ask you for your support of the Jewish community in Montana in a particular way during this holy time for both of our religious traditions. We invite your financial support for the Montana Jewish Project (MJP) centered in Helena but serving throughout the state.

The Montana Jewish Project is trying to repurchase the synagogue in Helena that was sold more than 100 years ago and has passed through several hands over the years. An opportunity has risen for them to buy back this important place of Jewish heritage in order to develop it as a community educational center for all Montanans (and others) to learn about the Jewish experience in Montana, to grow in a relationship of mutual support with the Jewish community, and to experience the Jewish faith as they practice and cherish it. (See here for more info)

The Montana Synod Council has already given \$4000 toward the project in the spirit of relationship with our Jewish neighbors. In this way, we are fulfilling the ongoing pledge we as the Montana Synod made in the "Agreement between Montana Synod Lutherans of the ELCA and Montana Association of Jewish Communities" signed in June 1995. Through this gift, we also stand with the wider ELCA in its "Declaration of the ELCA to the Jewish Community," originally adopted in 1994 and then reaffirmed by the Churchwide Council in 2021 and the "Declaration of Inter-Religions Commitment" adopted by the Churchwide Assembly in 2019. (You can find these documents here)

And we would ask you and your congregation to join together with the rest of the Montana Synod to match the council's \$4000 so that we can increase our support to \$8000. In this way we can continue our ongoing work of building mutually encouraging relationships with our Jewish siblings

We are hoping to raise this money by May 15, 2022. You may donate by clicking here and selecting Montana Jewish project or sending a check to the Synod office with "MT Jewish Project" in the memo line. Whatever gifts we are able to gather, we plan to give to the leaders of the MJP before the end of June which is an important deadline for them in purchasing the property.

This is important and loving work that we are doing. We know that throughout its history, the Christian church and its members have done deep harm to the Jewish people and their communities. Anti-Judaism and, later, anti-Semitism have been prevalent in the words and actions of Christians. This mistreatment is seen especially in Martin Luther's horrific diatribes and violent recommendations against the Jews in his later writings, in the silence of the Christian church (including Lutherans) during the Holocaust and its aftermath, and in too much overt and subtle bigoted behavior by Christians everywhere including here in Montana and N. Wyoming.

Sadly, this anti-Semitism is rising again in our polarized society through acts of violence and prejudice toward Jews and their communities. People who claim to follow Jesus are causing needless suffering and fear among our Jewish neighbors and their families with hate speech and prejudice, for instance seen the recent experience of a neighborhood in Great Falls throughout which anti-Semitic tracts were spread. Perhaps this has happened in your community as well.

Such behavior by Christians is wrong and contrary to the gospel of God's love for the whole world as well as God's command to love the neighbor -- all of our neighbors including our Jewish siblings. As witnesses to the good news of new life in and through Jesus Christ, Christians are called to seek peace, justice and the well-being of all God's children. We are called to work for the common good in our communities alongside people of other faiths and religions. We are called to confront bigotry directed against those who worship and believe differently, "playing an active role in dispelling fear...and standing with those who are targets of fear, discrimination, hatred and violence." (Declaration of Interreligious Commitment, 2019)

And we are called to repent of our previous behaviors and the actions of our ancestors by returning to the Lord our God so that we can better build healthy and supportive relationships with our Jewish neighbors. We are called to learn through respectful conversation, dialogue, growth in friendship and cooperation with people of other faiths, including the Jewish community and people.

During this time of learning, building relationships and cooperation in serving our community, creation and world, let us seek mutual understanding, discovering not only factual knowledge about the commonalities and differences of our respective traditions but finding beauty in another religious tradition as well as our own. For in seeing how our Jewish neighbors love and cherish their own tradition, we as Christians may renew our love and understanding of our own faith and tradition.

And so we ask for your support for the Montana Jewish Project, so that together we can show the love we have received from God by following God's command to love our neighbors.



There are still rental plots available for \$25. Please contact the church office (406-442-7842) for more information.



What's the Deal with Benevolence?

As we have discussed in previous Budget Forums, we intend to dedicate a certain percentage of general offerings received by the church to benevolence. Our benevolence goal has historically been as high as 15% of general offerings. However, we have not achieved our annual benevolence goal in recent years as monthly expenses tend to exceed general offerings received in most months during the year. Beginning in 2022, we as a congregation approved lowering the benevolence goal from 12% to 5% of general offerings, which is a more achievable goal considering our current financial status.

Benevolence monies are distributed to our benevolence partners, which include the ELCA Synod, Flathead Lutheran Bible Camp, and local partners. Our local partners are Family Promise, Friendship Center, God's Love, Good Samaritan, Helena Area Habitat for Humanity and Helena Food Share. Based on the revised benevolence goal of 5%, 4% is distributed to the ELCA Synod, ½% is distributed to Flathead Lutheran Bible Camp and the remaining ½% is divided between our local partners.

Although we have had trouble meeting our benevolence percentage in terms of general offerings in past years, we as a congregation have gone over and above to provide for our benevolence partners through donations of money, time and talent outside of general offerings. Examples for 2021, unless otherwise indicated, include the following:

- The congregation donated \$7,149.68 to the Hunger Team's 2021 summer milk campaign for Helena Food Share's Kid Pack Program. A local fund match brought the total to over \$13,000. Over 27,000 Kid Packs were assembled by congregational members during the 2021-2022 school year.
- 81 boxes were collected for Operation Christmas Child. In addition, the church serves as host for Lewis and Clark County for the Samaritan's Purse national collection week.
- WELCA sent 175 quilts sewn by congregational members to Lutheran World Relief.

- The High School Youth filled Christmas stockings with gifts for 24 youth at the Intermountain Children's Residential Treatment Center in part with a grant from Town Pump.
- Over the past 5 years (or so), a platoon of "old guys" that regularly meet on Wednesday mornings have contributed volunteer hours towards the building of the Synod House in Great Falls, the remodeling of Hagen Hall at Flathead Lutheran Bible Camp as well as the construction of a mini boathouse at the bible camp.
- For Lutheran World Relief, WELCA collected items to assemble 70 baby kits and 95 school kits, and the High School Youth collected items to assemble 138 personal care kits (in 20 minutes!).
- 672 volunteer hours were donated by overnight hosts for Family Promise. Approximately \$1,000 was donated by congregational members for dinners, groceries, snacks, and paper products.
- The community garden maintained by the Hunger Team offered over 2,000 pounds of produce to Helena Food Share. The congregation donated 1,366 pounds of food for Helena Food Share's holiday baskets.
- Numerous items (more than the Hunger Team and the High School Youth can count) were donated to God's Love, which included toiletries, blankets and winter clothing. One recipient was very appreciative of a pair of size 10 winter boots!

This list is not all inclusive- there are many more examples of giving that could be added to the list. Beginning in 2022, the Generosity Committee has teamed with various ORLC committees and our benevolence partners to call special attention to the needs of these ministries. The congregation should take pride in their generosity, <u>as well as creativity</u>, in serving our benevolence partners!
