Welcome to Fall 2023! Time for a few updates:

Update on staffing

- I hope you've met **Steph Richardson**, our new Interim Director for Youth Ministry. Steph is off and running as she gets acquainted with our middle and high school youth and their families and plans activities for the fall. Her first event, Slip and Slide Kickball had 20 middle schoolers attend!
- Jason Callon continues to help us with weekly worship as we search for a new Director of Worship. A team consisting of Lyanne Den Herder, Autumn Keller, Jim Penner, and Lisa Williams-Mathews has been formed to update the job description and interview potential candidates. Pray that we will find someone with great musical ability and the technical skills that position new requires.
- Seminarian Baird Linke will be back in Helena from September through December as he finishes his last semester of classes online and has agreed to help with some preaching, youth events, and getting a new fellowship group focused on young adults up and running (more below on this). We are grateful for his presence among us again, even if it is only for a few months.
- The Call Committee has let us know they have a good candidate to review for the Associate Pastor position. Thanks be to God! Please hold the committee and the candidate in prayer as they explore this possibility together, and don't put committee members in a difficult place by asking for any details at this point. When the time is right, all will be revealed.
- Liz Swenson (children's ministry), Lori Walter (office), Sarah Magee (finances), Kris Thatcher (preschool), Linda Keim (organist), and David McHaley (custodian) all continue to be a joy to work with, and I have appreciated their flexibility in this time of staff transitions.

Update on Fall programming

• Sunday, September 17, is our big fall kickoff. We're calling it Rally Sunday, an older phrase but one that carries with it the excitement of new beginnings as we rally the congregation and head into a new programming season together. We will return to two services that Sunday, 8:30am and 11:00am, with Sunday School between services for ages 3 to grade 5 (confirmation for grades 6-8 begins the following week). We will celebrate with a potluck at noon, with several leaders hosting tables so you can hear more about ministry opportunities at Our Redeemer's.

September 2023

- Confirmation and Youth Group (Safehouse) will begin on Wednesday, September 20. We are going to structure Wednesday evenings a bit differently this fall, with dinner offered to our middle and high school students at 6:30pm, a short worship in the Youth Loft to follow, and then middle and high school students meeting separately from 7:00 to 8:00pm. As we did last year, confirmation is offered both Wednesday and Sunday, with the same lesson taught both times. Dennis Trotter is taking the lead on teaching, assisted by Liz and Steph. They will be focusing on the life of Jesus and the New Testament this year.
- The Wednesday night worship service is on hold for now as we await a new pastor and a new worship director. Those who have regularly attended the last couple of years know that attendance has dwindled to about 20 a week. We will continue to explore the worship needs of Our Redeemer's and hope to offer some new things once we're fully staffed again. We will offer Holden Evening Prayer in Lent...no messing with what works well!
- We will be offering two new fellowship groups

this fall. Our Redeemer's has been experiencing growth among young adults (ages 21-35), and so we will be starting a **Young Adults** group with the help of seminarian Baird Linke. We will also be starting a group for **Singles over 40** who might be interested in joining together for fellowship (movies, a meal out, walking/hiking, concerts, crafting). Update on Pastor Trina

If you've been in worship this summer, you've noticed that I am able to get around better each week and have even returned to helping serve communion and was able to stand for the recent baptism of sweet Luke Liston. I'm still a little wobbly and can't stand for long periods of time, but I continue with three times a week physical therapy and should be fully back to myself soon. For those new to our fellowship, I caught COVID in late December, which put a rare autoimmune disease I have into overdrive. That, coupled with the high doses of steroids and other medications needed to manage things, caused medically induced myopathy. This resulted in my being unable to walk or stand very well, but reducing the medications and a lot of physical therapy has turned things around. If we have an active flu or covid season this winter. I'll likely mask up for a few weeks. The doctors tell me that any virus can trigger this, so I'll be doing my best to avoid them.

Thank you again, beloved community, for all your care over the past many months. Here's to a full and exciting beginning to the programming year. Blessings as we worship, learn, serve, and play together as Christ's people in this place.



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Rob and Carolee Stuberg: From the Montana Synod to Tanzania

Six months out of each year, Rob and Carolee Stuberg attend Immanuel Lutheran Church in Missoula, MT. The other six months, they live in Tanzania where Rob, a Deacon with the ELCA, teaches at the Mwika Lutheran Bible and Theological College.

Rob was the Director of Worship and Arts at Our Redeemer's in Helena for 18 years. Now he and Carolee are retired when they are in Montana, and working full-time when they are in Tanzania.

Their first trip was with a group organized by their pastor, who had connections in Tanzania. That was the beginning. They traveled to Tanzania four times, for two to three weeks each time, including one longer stay during a sabbatical. Then the Stubergs committed to serving in an official capacity. This coming September, the Stubergs will begin their sixth year living, serving, and teaching side-by-side with Lutheran Tanzanians.



Initially, Carolee worked in a program for women and orphans. Now she runs their household – which requires a lot of work as there are no modern conveniences. "I would not be able to teach if it weren't for Carolee running the house, being travel agent and making sure we are where we are supposed to be. In fact, our first trip to Tanzania was her idea," Rob said.

Rob is a teacher at Mwika Lutheran Bible and Theological College, a seminary owned and operated by the Northern dioceses of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania.

"We train future pastors, evangelists, parish workers, and church musicians," Rob said. "I teach in the areas of Liturgy and Music. The seminary has about 350 students, and over half are female. It takes four years of study to become a pastor, three years to become an evangelist or parish worker, and we offer both two and four-year programs for church musicians." Rob is currently the only faculty member that is not Tanzanian.



The Stubergs live and teach in Tanzania because of the warm, welcoming nature of the Tanzanian people and their way of life. Rob explained that it's been said, "Tanzanians have an experience of God we should not live without." That experience of God is evident in many ways, but most obvious is their hospitality. Tanzanians say "visitors are a blessing from God," and they treat guests in their homes, churches, towns, and country with a welcome and hospitality that Rob and Carolee have never experienced elsewhere. This welcome is part of Tanzanian culture, but one could argue that it is also a Biblical mandate throughout Hebrew Scripture and the New Testament, Rob said.

The students Rob teaches are financially very poor by western standards, but they value education and feel it is a privilege to be educated and to find vocation in the church. "Teachers here are highly respected, and the students usually carry my backpack and guitar around campus for me, and greet me with "Shikamoo Mwalimu", meaning 'I respect you teacher'." The students also understand that the teachers genuinely care and deeply want the best for their students.

The Stubergs have learned many things over their years in Tanzania and one of the most interesting cultural differences has to do with living in the present.

"While people in the US and Europe tend to lean more toward thinking about the future, i.e. our next meeting or our next 'whatever', that isn't the case in Tanzania," Rob said. "In Tanzania, the most important thing is relationship and what is happening now, in the present. Just saying "hi' to a stranger you meet walking on the path can take several minutes. So, if a current conversation keeps someone from being on time for a future appointment, it is accepted as normal." The Stubergs said that Westerners who visit Tanzania can easily get frustrated about things like appointments, schedules, and starting time of events that Tanzanians just don't think is a big deal.

There is a saying, "Americans have the watches, but Tanzanians have the time," Rob said. "We are getting more and more used to this way of thinking. Just accepting and learning from it as a cultural difference is very helpful to leading a less frustrated life."

As the Stubergs continue both learning and teaching, they feel thankful for the experience. "It is a great privilege knowing that we are directly helping to shape the future leaders of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania,

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even know with any accuracy how others perceive us. More importantly, living to please others distorts and diminishes the person God made us to be. A bass can try to sing a soprano part, but neither he nor the listener will enjoy it, and the world will be deprived of a bass voice.

2023 MONTANA PROPERTY TAX REBATE

The Montana Property Tax Rebate is a rebate to eligible Montana taxpayers who were billed and paid property taxes on their principal residence for tax year 2022. The rebate is up to \$675 or an amount not to exceed 2022 property taxes on a principal Montana residence. If you qualify, you <u>must file a claim by October 1, 2023.</u> To file a claim go to "<u>getmyrebate.mt.gov"</u> and follow the website instructions. To complete the form you will use your social security number, your Department of Revenue letter with letter id, the amount of 2022 property tax you paid, and your Geocode (found on website "cadastral.mt.gov").

Please consider investing a portion of your rebate into the work we do as a church family. Thank you from the Stewardship Committee.

What I'm Learning In Voice (and Life) Lessons

I recently began voice lessons with Chas Elliott, who was a member of Our Redeemers for many years and has accompanied and performed here several times over the last few years. Though I took lessons throughout high school and college, that was a long time ago. And, while I have sung and performed a lot throughout the intervening years, I was interested to see what I could learn from someone who really knows what they're doing. Here are some of the things I've been learning and relearning, along with broader applications to a life of faith.

 Singing properly requires three basic components: breath, structure, and space. Breath provides power to vibrate the vocal cords. The solid structure and hollow space of our bodies work in tandem to amplify and develop sound waves produced by vibrating vocal cords. When those three elements are aligned and unrestricted, the result is a powerful, multidimensional, unique sound that can elicit both joy and tears.

Christians live by faith powered by God's Spirit. That Spirit moves through us and resonates with the structures of our relationships, our work, and our daily interactions. The space we provide in our lives (through prayer, study, worship, attentive silence) amplifies and shapes that resonance. The power of the Spirit acting on the healthy structures of our lives with spacious freedom produces nothing less than abundant life.

 Singing correctly (i.e., healthily) requires a lot of effort, effort that must be carefully focused and channeled to be effective. We generally picture lungs when we think of the respiratory system. But the lungs cannot fill or empty themselves. The diaphragm and the abdominal muscles combine to produce the primary motive force for breathing. The diaphragm forms the floor of the chest cavity and contracts downward to create space that vacuums air into the lungs. The abdominal muscles contract upward against the diaphragm to squeeze air out of the lungs. Creating and coordinating tension between these two sets of muscles moves a sustained, controlled column of air through the vocal cords and recharges the lungs. That requires energy. It can seem removed from singing, though, which we often visualize as happening in our throats and chests. That perception unintentionally attracts tension to our upper bodies, tension that is not very effective; it's inefficient and restricts and deforms the space needed to create a full, resonant sound. Much of singing is trusting in and relying on a designed-in source of effective power and getting out of its way.

Living is tension. We can't move without friction. (Well, we can, but that kind of movement is known as falling.) The source of the tension that produces movement in our lives hugely affects the quality of our lives. God would have us rely on the power of the Spirit to energize our lives. As that power acts on us and through us, it removes obstacles that prevent our connection to the ultimate Source of life. But we often fail to trust in that infinite power. Instead, we try to produce it on our own. The result is inefficient, restrictive, and distorting tension that tends to do more harm than good.

• We can't know what we sound like to others. The sound in our heads is not the sound others perceive. I've always known that but never appreciated its profound implications. I've tended to listen for and analyze the sound I'm making and try adjusting it to satisfy my concept of good sound. There are at least three big problems with that approach. First, because I don't hear what others hear, it may not sound good to them. Second, my inward focus detracts from the primary reason for performing, which is to create an enjoyable experience for a listener. It also leads to overcontrolling, which leads to restriction, which diminishes the power and freedom of the sound. Overcoming this tendency toward singing-bylistening requires a knowledgeable and skilled guide and a tremendous amount of trust. The trust part has been very difficult for me. I'm having to learn how it feels in my body to make a sound that Chas tells me is good—or less good—outside my head, trust in that assessment, and try to recreate the conditions that generated the good sound while avoiding the conditions that did not. I need to work on being attuned to, and controlling, my body as I'm singing and trusting that good sound will result, regardless of how I perceive it.

Finally, what makes a sound "good" is largely a matter of personal taste and depends on the style of music being sung. High-quality vocal production should be healthy and sustainable, but every voice is different. No one voice is suited for all kinds of music. A singer needs to know his/her limits, but within those limits, he/she must focus on producing his/her own unique sound using techniques that maximize purity and flexibility. Attempting to change one's voice to suit specific tastes or to produce music for which it is not suited will satisfy neither the singer nor the listener.

The ways we experience the world are highly individualized, subject to myriad factors beyond our control. Trying to live so that others perceive us a "good" and worthy is destined for failure. We can't
